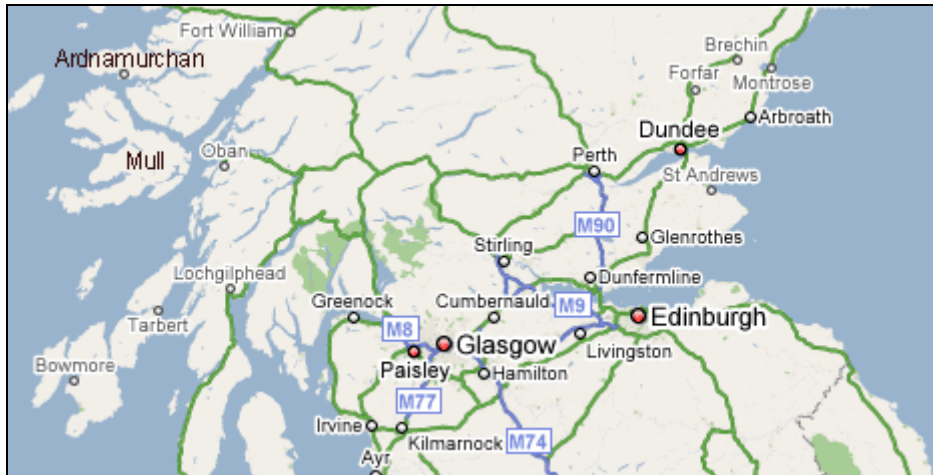


## Directions to South 10 Oran na Mara, Kilchoan, Acharacle, Argyll PH36 4LL



Coming from the South there are two routes: one is to follow the A74 Glasgow/Stirling and take the M9 for Perth, then take Exit 11 to Doune/Crianlarich.

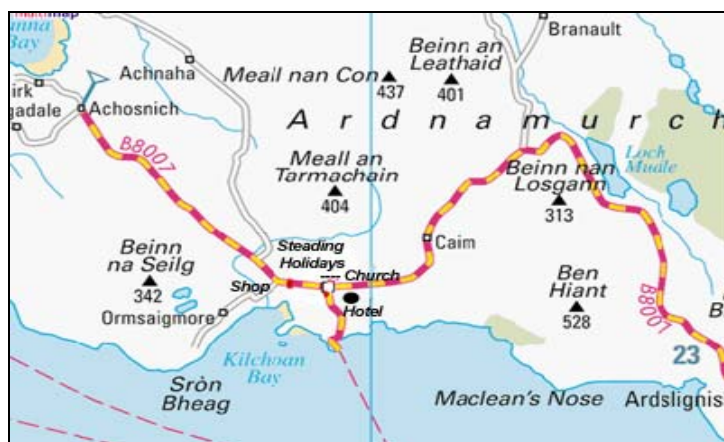
Alternatively, you can cross Glasgow (by motorway and the Erskine Bridge) and drive up the shores of Loch Lomond on the A82 to Crianlarich.

From Crianlarich continue north on the A82, following the signs for Fort William. Two miles after you have crossed over the Ballachulish Bridge turn left and go across the Corran Ferry.

It is advisable to fill up with fuel prior to this as the Kilchoan shop and pumps are only open briefly on Sundays and fuel is sold at a premium.

From the Corran Ferry, the last 30 miles of road (from the outskirts of Strontian to Kilchoan) is single-track with many bends and consequentially slow.

Coming off the ferry, turn left and head for Salen on the A861, and then turn left again, taking the B8007 to Kilchoan. Please try and leave yourself plenty of time for this part of the journey as it takes at **least** an hour and a half once you have crossed the Corran Ferry.



To find **Oran na Mara**: as you come into the village of Kilchoan there is a Hotel on your left then a Church on your right, closely followed by the Steading Holiday's offices on your right where we will be happy to help you. Continue on this road along the shore until you come to the Ferry Stores on your right and petrol pumps on your left. Continue on the main road which turns to your right going up a hill. Continue along and **Oran na Mara** is the third house on the right. The driveway is steep. Please park on the gravel area just after you go through the gate.

### Single-track roads

When driving on single-track roads please remember: passing places are indicated with signs, and **must** be used to permit oncoming traffic to proceed and to allow following traffic to overtake. **Always** stay on the **left-hand** side of the road when using passing places. No one minds how slowly anybody else drives along these roads, so long as they pull in to allow following vehicles to pass; always be aware that the car behind could contain a doctor or a member of one of the emergency services. **Never** park in passing places (however beautiful the view might be!); they are **not** viewpoints.
